## **Natural Communities**

The open fields and meadows are home to monarch butterflies, which use this area as a breeding ground because it contains large amounts of milkweed. These spaces provide habitat for grassland-nesting birds, like meadowlarks and bobolinks. CLC mows the property to promote grassland bird habitat.

In the forest, you can see a number of different species like raptors (such as eagles and hawks), songbirds, and large mammals like deer.

The property's tidal wetlands include two rare natural communities - Freshwater Natural Marshes and Freshwater Intertidal Mudflats. The marshes and mudflats are home to rare plants, like estuary beggar tick and heart-leafed plantain.

# **Site History**

In the early 1600s, prior to European settlement, Mahican Indians lived and hunted in the woods along the Hudson River. In 1661, the land was purchased from the Mahicans by a Dutch settler and used for farming. From 1892 - 1937, there was an active brickyard along the Yellow Trail.

# **Project History**

In 1992, the Open Space Institute (OSI), in collaboration with CLC, purchased the original 400 acres of Greenport Conservation Area. In 2013, OSI conveyed the property to CLC. The "Access for All" trail was made possible by a grant from the Hudson River Foundation and funded by the Athens Generating Company in conjunction with Scenic Hudson. CLC thanks grantors Lila Acheson and DeWitt Wallace Fund for the Hudson Highlands, the Wellspring Foundation, the Iroquois Gas Transmission System Land Preservation and Enhancement Program, Hudson River Foundation, and Hudson River Valley Greenway for their support. # Public Conservation Area Trail Guide & Map







#### **Access for All Trail**

#### 1.5 miles, 45 minutes

This wheelchair-accessible trail begins at the Joslen Boulevard parking lot and allows visitors of all abilities to view the beautiful landscapes of the Hudson River Valley.

# Blue/Stockport-Greenport Trail

#### 2.62 miles, 75 minutes

This trail begins at conclusion of the Access for All trail. It traverses forested slopes, crossing several streams and passing above a hidden backwater of the Hudson before breaking out into the open meadows of Harrier Hill with its wide Hudson River views.

#### **Yellow Trail**

#### 1.5 miles, 45 minutes

The trail leads through forests and across streams and includes a spur trail to a high bluff with views of the River's North Bay.

#### **Green Trail**

## 0.3 miles, 20 minutes

The steep Green Trail winds through forested slopes and across seasonal streams.

## **Red/Town Park Trail**

### 0.5 miles, 30 minutes

The Red Trail rises up a steep hill and crosses a seasonal stream to a scenic overlook of the Hudson River.

## **Orange Trail**

### 0.75 miles, 30 minutes


This loop crosses the heads of two ravines and includes a long ridgetop spur to a high bluff.
